


Field Trip to Milwaukee Public Museum

Students in grades 5K - 5th grade went on a school field trip the Milwaukee Public Museum on Thursday, April 27. Younger students went on a scavenger hunt touring the Streets of Old Milwaukee. It was fun to find objects from back then and now.

The older students covered several Social Studies standards at the museum by viewing the Native American exhibits and completing a graphic organizer. Students focused on the homes, tools, and food of the Hopi, Menomonee, Blackfoot, and Kwakiutl tribes.

All students watched a planetarium show called "Surviving in Space", which was narrated by astronaut, Karen Nyberg.

Classroom Happenings



Engineering Classes Participate in Competition

Mr. Clowers' Engineering Classes participated in the STEM Forward competition at WCTC. Middle school students worked together to create a contraption that hammers a nail in eight or more steps. There were seven participating schools. What a great experience for our CELA students! It was a fun learning experience.





Fifth Grade Science

In the fifth grade science investigation, students observed the effects mining has on the geosphere by "mining" chocolate chips from chocolate chip cookies. The cookie represented the land, and the chips represented coal. Students were to mine the coal using a toothpick, water, fork, knife, and paper clip.

Each piece of coal they mined could be sold to the power plant for \$1,000. After students mined the coal, they totaled up their profits.

Then, they observed and discussed how mining affected the geosphere. The land was badly damaged. Next, each student was given another cookie to mine, but now they were fined \$200 for each piece of cookie that broke off. This time students changed their mining techniques, were a lot more careful and damaged a lot less land. We discussed how a fine for damaging land is one-way people try to minimize the effects of coal mining on Earth. Finally, we discussed other ways people or engineers can reduce the negative effects of coal mining.





Seventh Graders Present Dioramas

In seventh grade ELA class the students completed reading the novel, Animal Farm by George Orwell. To complete their novel study, students were tasked with creating a diorama on a specific scene in which they felt there was great significance. They were required to write a speech describing the scene they chose, the significance of the scene, an explanation of the characters in the scene, and the importance of why they chose their specific scene. Students presented their dioramas along with their speeches in class on Thursday April 27.
